Join us in welcoming, Shawn Dougherty to the Board of Supervisors. Shawn moved to Jefferson County from his home state of Oklahoma, where his family had been farming and ranching since the 1889 Land Run. He and his wife, Beth, were always determined to raise their family in the country, so while teaching as a professor at Franciscan University, Shawn began searching for land. The 24 acres the Dougherty's purchased in 1996 may not look like a farm to conventional folks, but in 26 years it has been transformed into a functioning homestead that feeds their family and others, with four-season gardens, a small hoop house, dairy and beef cattle, sheep, pigs, and poultry. Their special interest is no-inputs food production with grass management at the center.

In 2015, wanting to focus more time on developing farming, grazing, and food production methods and skills, Shawn took early retirement from Franciscan to work part time as Maintenance coordinator for the Franciscan convent where the Dougherty's rent thirty acres of pasture for their expanded Jersey/cross herd.

He and his wife began writing and speaking on family food production and small-scale intensive grazing at events and conferences; in 2016 their book on small-scale grass management and food production, *The Independent Farmstead*, was published by Chelsea Green Publishing in Vermont. The Dougherty's also hold periodic workshops on their home farm to help other folks get started in grazing and home food production.

The Dougherty's attribute much of their education in grass management to work with the Eastern Ohio Grazing Council and to pasture walks, where they have been able to gain information and experience sharing with local graziers.

Locally and on the state level, Shawn has served on several boards, including the Ohio Theatre Alliance and the Grand Theatre in Steubenville. Presently he is also working with the Urban Mission as an advisor to their Backyard Food Garden initiative, intended to help Steubenville area residents overcome obstacles to backyard food production. Shawn is excited to bring the knowledge and methods he and Beth have acquired over the years to help Jefferson County residents on a limited amount of land achieve food independence.

Shawn and Beth have been married for 36 years, and have eight children and, presently, ten grandchildren.

In 2019, Moore and Dodds began talking with the Ohio Envirothon Committee and the Ohio Federation of Soil and Water Conservation Districts (OFSWCD) about the possibility of hosting the event in Ohio in 2022.

Ohio is known nationwide for the strength of its regional and state Envirothon programs, as well as its diverse natural resources, exceptional colleges and universities, and endless list of enjoyable and educational things to do. Ohio's Envirothon leadership felt it was a good fit for the program, making its efforts to host the 2022 event official, with the competition to be held at Miami University in Oxford, Ohio July 24 through July 29, 2022.

The Ohio Envirothon State Committee has brought together educators from around the state to coordinate the week-long event and has selected "*Waste to Resources*" as this year's theme. This current environmental issue recognizes the urban-rural interface of our diverse state.
